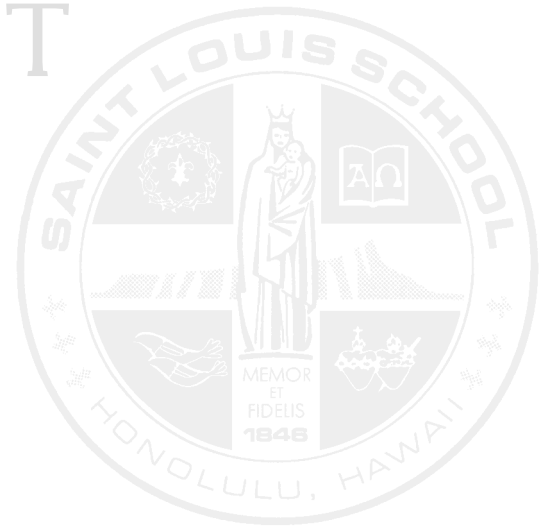

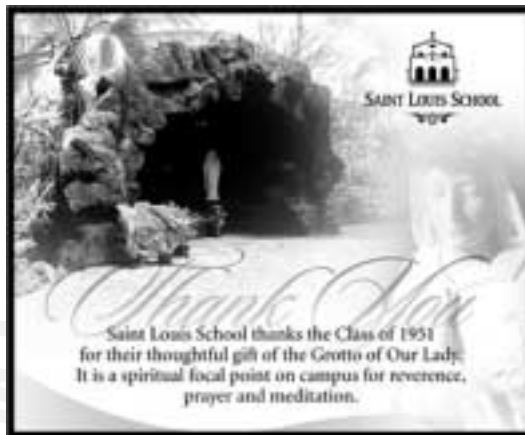

August marks the end of a long "hot" summer, one that was "sizzling" with reunions. Most classes begin fund raising 5-10 years prior to their 50th Anniversary Reunion. My class, the Class of 1958, has agreed to begin fund-raising activities in the community this year, because, although the main source of donations is expected to come from my classmates in the form cash contributions and pledges, we're trying to make it as easy as possible on each of our classmates, as well as increase class participation and camaraderie.

Membership Renewals

Typically, July is the month that most annual memberships are renewed because until recently, all annual memberships expired on June 30th. From now on, renewals will be spread throughout the fiscal year. Previously, members who renewed their memberships later than July of the new fiscal year were penalized or "short changed" for the remaining number of months until expiration. Under the previous method, a member who renewed their membership in January had only (5) months of active membership remaining until

the expiration date of June 30th. Now we will process renewals at any time and the expiration date will be (12) months from the date of renewal. You will receive a renewal notice 30 days prior to the date that your membership expires.

Our active (paid) memberships continue to increase every month, and we thank you for this. We witness the efforts that the Class Reps have made to encourage their classmates to renew their memberships. I need not justify the value of your active membership to you, because you're enjoying one the benefits right now - your Alumni Newsletter.

Class of '53 Gift to Saint Louis

"No sale of chicken, sausage or chili. We're past that." That's what Donald Caindec reported to the Class of 1953 Reunion Committee. Instead, classmates were asked directly for monetary donations that fit whatever they could afford. All donations were sent to a special holding fund managed by the school. To make things interesting, the Committee decided to recognize donations according to the level of contribution. Out of 67 donors, there were 32 Crusaders, 29 Red Crusaders, 4 Blue Crusaders and 2 Gold Crusaders. In all, nearly \$50,000 was collected. As a result, the Class of 1953 will sponsor a Pavilion for the Saint Louis Middle School.

In any event, the key to ensuring that your class will be able to raise enough money for a "class gift" is to start building your fund as early as possible. Just do the math and you'll see the benefit of starting now.

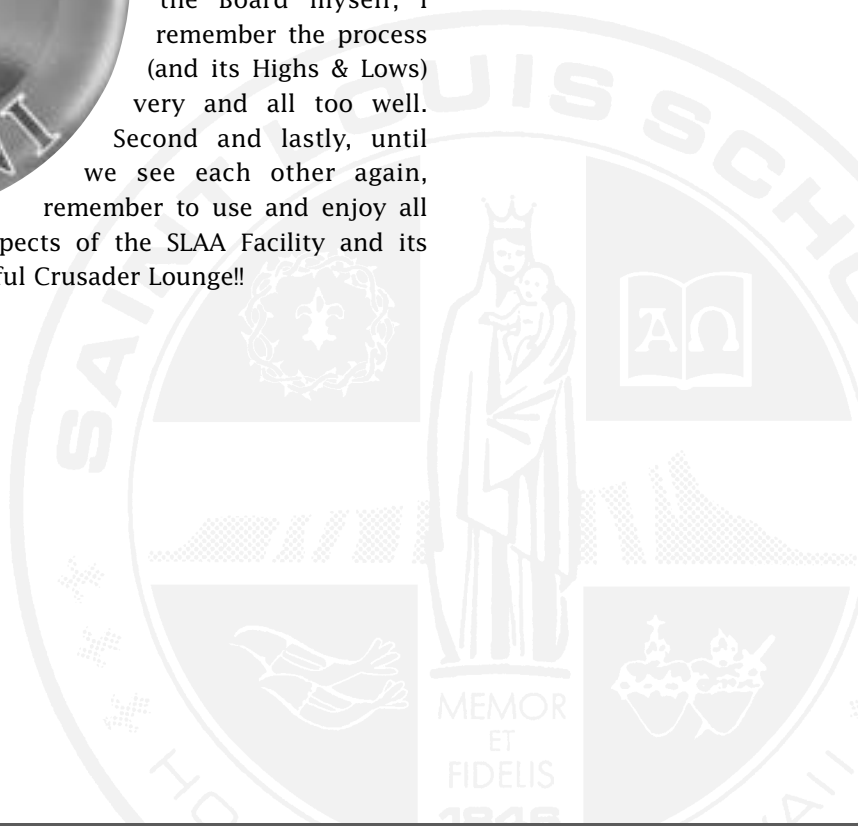
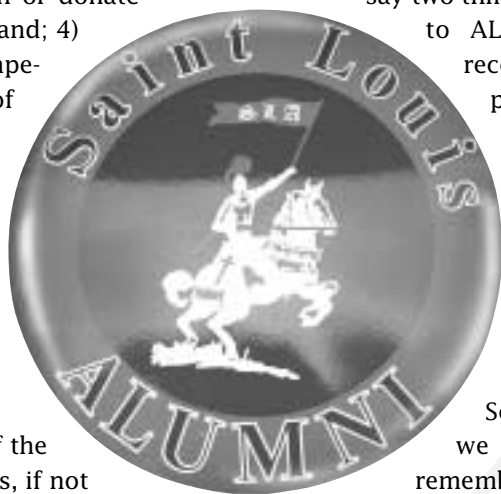

Financial Assistance After High School

The SLAA Financial Assistance Committee has, for the last few years, provided monetary support for descendants of St. Louis Alumni to help subsidize the cost of tuition at Saint Louis School. Parents and grandparents of students who benefited from this assistance should also become familiar with the various kinds of financial aid available for those students who plan to attend college.

Financial aid helps many families meet college costs and every year thousands of students apply and receive financial assistance. In fact, about half of all students who go on for more education after school, receive financial aid of some kind. Student financial aid is available from a number of sources, including the federal and state government, colleges, universities and other organizations. Students may receive aid from more than one source.

There are three main types of financial assistance available to qualified students at the college level:

I. Grants and Scholarship

These types provide aid that does not need to be repaid. However, some require that recipients maintain a certain grade level or take certain courses.

II. Loans

Loans are another type of financial aid and are available to both students and parents. Like a car loan or mortgage for a house, and education loan must eventually be repaid. Often, payments do not begin until the student finishes school, and the interest rate is commonly lower than other types of loans.

For students with no established credit record, it is usually easier to obtain student loans than other kinds of loans. There are many different kinds of education loans and in all cases, a loan taken to pay for college education must be repaid, whether or not a student finishes school or gets a job after graduation. Failure to repay a student loan can ruin a person's credit rating and make finances much more difficult in the future.

III. Work Study Programs

Many students work during the summer and/or part-time during the school year to help pay for college. Although many obtain jobs on their own, many colleges also offer work-study programs to their students. A work-study program is often part of a student's financial aid package. The jobs are usually on campus and the money earned is used to pay for tuition or other college expenses.

The types of financial aid discussed above can be merit-based, need-based, or a combination of both.

Merit-based assistance, usually in form of scholarships or grants, is given to students who meet requirements, not related to financial needs. For example, a merit scholarship may be given to a student who has done well in high school or one who displays artistic or athletic talent. Most merit-based aid is awarded on the basis of academic performance or potential.

Need-based means that the amount of aid a student can receive depends on the cost of the college, and or, on his or her family's ability to pay these costs. Most financial aid is need-based and is available to qualified students.

STUDENT AID

If you need help in obtaining information about funds for your child's education, the guidance counselors at your child's high school should be able to provide information on when and how to apply for federal, state and other types of aids. If they cannot give you this information, try a local college. Even if your child doesn't plan to attend that particular institution, financial aid officers there should have information on federal and state financial aid.

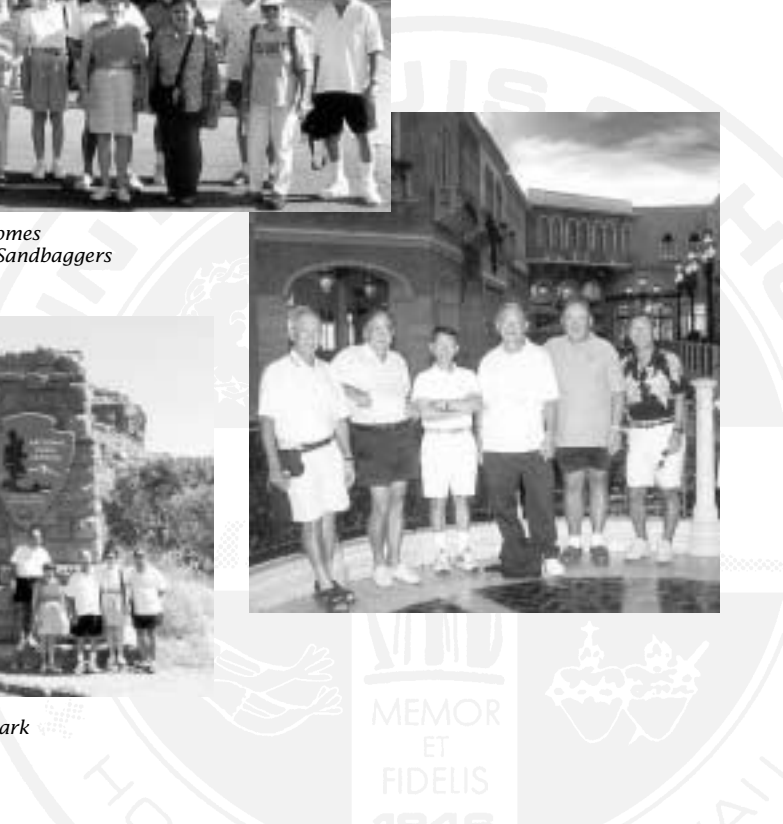

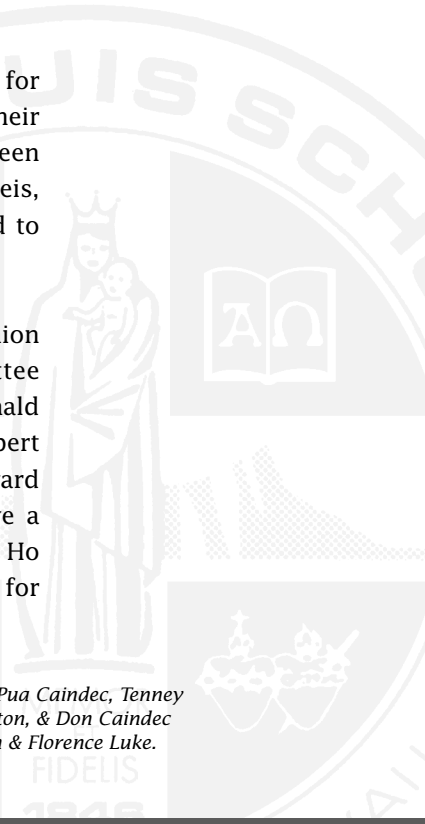


Class Kitty Boost

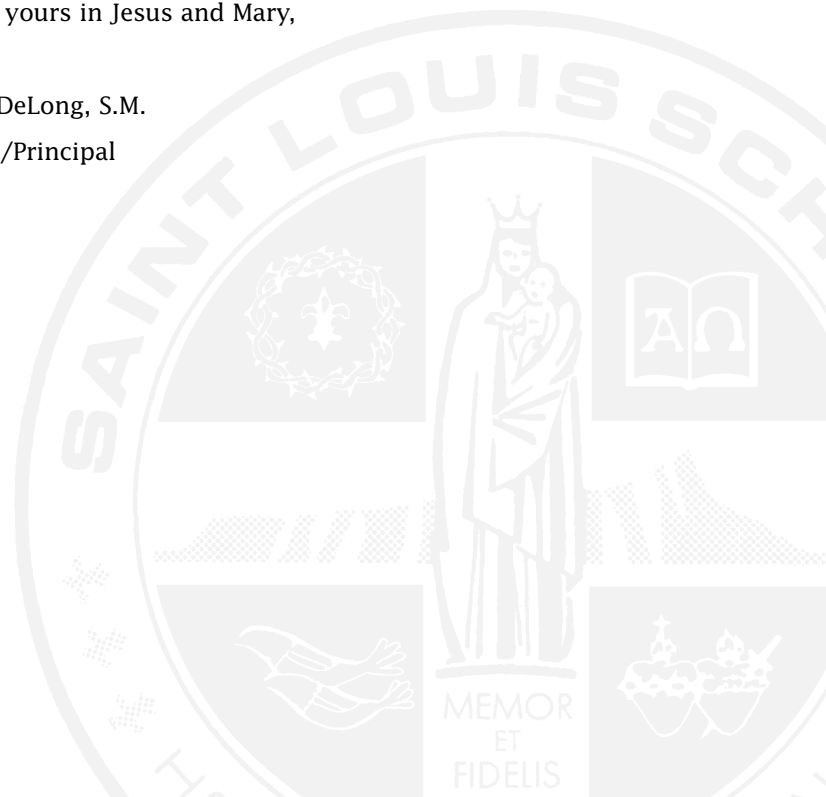
